# LISTENING TO FASCISM, TRANSMITTING ANTIFASCISM: A WORKSHOP May 7, 9 and 10 2025

## Workshop description

"We are navigating incredibly dark times: conservative forces, distinctly resonating with fascist genealogies or showing new facets of fascism, are gaining state power on an international level. New modes of dispossession are prolonging and amplifying local yet common histories of injustice. Fragments of fascist discourse reach our ears daily: in the news, on social media, in the street. The temptation to cover one's ears is strong. Yet, this workshop explored the intuition that listening closely and collectively to those fragments might be useful to not only confront the grammar of old and new forms of

fascism, but also to recoup, and construct together, one many soundscapes of antifascist resistance.

This community engagement workshop explored audio materials featuring fragments of the fascist and antifascist soundscape. The invitation to participants was to identify clots of fascist discourse, point at returning tropes, and make them available for critical recognition and deconstruction. While listening to the contemporary fascist soundscape on one's own is excruciating, these collective sessions were thought as a way to hold each other and collaborate in deciphering the words and tones through which fascism is forcefully colonizing our ears.

On a conceptual and political level, this workshop was inspired by Walter Benjamin's and Bertolt Brecht's belief in the potential of radio as an instrument of political education and popular knowledge production: reflections developed almost exactly a century ago, in the wake of the first rise to power of fascism. It is in this spirit that this workshop mobilized the listeners as experts, whose experience of fascism is not the product of scholarly knowledge but is embodied memory, affective resonance of personal and common histories." - Giulia Palladini

### **Workshop notes**

#### Session 1

# Main questions / themes that emerged:

- How to recognize fascism?
- We agreed upon the necessity to address fascism in its plural manifestations, as embodied memory and lived experience, rather than conceptual or historical matter: 'Fascism is not be debated, it is to be destroyed' (Buenaventura Durruti)
- What to do with words and modes of expressions historically used in fascist discourse? Is it possible to reappropriate them? How about words which are part of an antifascist repertoire, such as 'freedom'?

- We identified ways in which fascist discourse has penetrated into our very language, and realized that we need to pay attention to the resonances we may convey: i.e. expressions such as virus, toxicity, imaginaries of contagion, disease, illness, or else, bias regarding accents, tones, modes of speech.
- Fascism started to appear in speech as radical and violent reduction of language and life possibilities
- How is 'tone' contributing to fascism or antifascism? How does 'tone' make or dismantle a fascist discourse?

#### Session 2

### Main questions / themes that emerged:

- Idea of antifascism as the creation of 'antibodies' and 'probodies'
- What is affirmative antifascism?
- What strategist can be invented, or recuperated, to interrupt fascist discourse?
  - Among them: refuse, montage, collage, decontextualization, satire. Each has its own logic of subversion (can anything be subverted?)
    - How to repurpose fascist discourse through montage?
    - How to craft forms of empathy without preventing, when needed, violent interruption of fascist discourse?
  - Is repetition solely a fascist device? Could it be reappropriated?
  - o Is call and response a structure necessarily preventing dissensus?
  - O How to cultivate dissonance?

#### Session 3

## Main questions / themes that have emerged:

- What are the tools of antifascist resistance? Can noise be a weapon? Can silence be a weapon?
- What are examples of antifascist resistance using sounds traditionally associated to fascist violence in order to turn them upside down?
- Can art-making be a form of training for antifascist resistance?
- How to hold space for complexity against the simplification and vulgarity propelled by fascist discourse?
- How to practice non-extractivist fieldwork in community art projects?
- How to navigate ambivalence? We came to realize that the grammar of each antifascist strategy we identified could easily be deployed by fascist discourse, and the other way around. This brought us to think antifascism in relation to the necessity to listen carefully and not let go of complexity.
